discussions that challenge and inspire! Join us for conversation on Thursdays, December 3, 10, 17 at 11:00 AM at the Parsonage!


Soup Suppers: Nourishment for Body, Mind & Soul

We're reading and discussing Penny Gill's book "What in the World is Going On? Wisdom Teachings for Our Time." Penny Gill, a





Please take a moment to fill out and return the enclosed with a check or pledge. In the meantime, know that you have my gratitude and hope for the time when we'll gather together again.



Spirituality: Widening the Crossbeam

Pastor Marina and the St. John's Council continue engaging in discussions about how we are evolving and how our Strategic Plan is guiding us in spiritual leadership. Below is an excerpt from Franz Rigert, UCC Wisconsin Conference Minister discussing Diana Butler Bass' newly published book, *Grounded*.



Bass offers new framework for the Church of the 21st Century ...if we intend to spiritually engage our society in relevant and transforming ways.


At the same time that institutional religion continues to decline, the discovery of new spiritual practices continues to rise. While we sing our age-old lament about dying churches,

millions in our society are waking up to fresh encounters with the Sacred. For too long, too many in the Church have viewed this paradox through the lens of religious turf - that is who they are; this is who we are. Butler Bass says, "Nonsense!" We've created a false and unnecessary dichotomy. Instead of drudging up old conversations about the rise of the "Dones & Nones" in Church world, we should explore new ministries that connect us with the rise of the mystics (as she refers to this movement). In other words, our calling may not be to make the spiritual more religious, but rather the religious more spiritual. The vital Church of tomorrow will work for a "just and generous world" (words of Cameron Trimble) through synthesizing the religious traditions of Church with the spiritual practices of the rising mystics. The walls between Culture and Church will become more permeable, the mission will be more collaborative, and the innovators will lead us!

The Church has tended to align itself vertically - the erecting of steeples, the raising up of altars, the lifting of prayers to the heavens, the elevating of bishops. This hierarchical approach built the institutional Church. It thrived in an era of "membership" and a time when the city square gave it a prominent voice and immense influence. The vertical portion of the cross also symbolically emphasizes personal redemption and salvation . . . and the exclusive notion of only through the cross. Instead, Diana Butler Bass calls us to widen the crossbeam, to extend our reach, to stretch the arms of Jesus in order to embrace and care for the entire world.

Need Some Gift Ideas?

Consider a book for a friend or family member! To launch discussion at November's Council meeting, Pastor Marina Lachecki read a passage from *The Great Emergence: How Christianity is Changing and Why.*



Phyllis Tickle's premise is that we are in the midst of a pivotal time in Church history, one that is equally rivals the radical impact of the Protestant Revolution.

Tickle contends that every 500 years, Christianity experiences a significant transformation.

According to one review on Amazon, "Counting back from the present, the Great

Reformation took place about 500 years ago -- 1517 to be exact. Prior to that, The Great Schism occurred when the Eastern and Western churches split over icons and statues. Five hundred years earlier, Gregory the Great blessed and encouraged the monastic orders which would preserve the Christian faith through the Dark Ages. Of course, 500 years before that, we're back in the first century and the time of the apostles. Today, Tickle contends, the church in in the throes of The Great Emergence.

But, the Great Emergence is not just religious. It is also cultural, technological, and sociological. Of course, context shaped each of the other `great' church transformations as well, and this time is no different. Tickle takes the reader on an overflight of church history, world events, and charts the shifts in the center of authority in the life of the church. In the Great Reformation, of course, the cry of authority was sola scriptura - only scripture. Tickle traces the diminution of the authoritative place of scripture in culture and Christianity from its heady beginnings in the Reformation to its marginalization in the current postmodern era. The book provides thoughtful tracing of influential elements as Tickle leads the reader on a quest for a center of authority."
